Amendment	Summary	Vote
<b>Sponsor's Amendment</b>	Substitute of the bill S.744	<b>Passed</b> by a vote of 14-4
<b>Leahy 1</b>	prohibits border crossing fees at land ports of entry	<b>Passed</b> by a voice vote
<b>Grassley 2</b>	provides that DHS must submit several border related and other reports to various Senate and House committees	
<b>Grassley 5</b>	Requires yearly audits of the Trust Fund	
<b>Cornyn 6</b>	Includes the "Human Trafficking Reporting Act of 2013"	
<b>Sessions 36</b>	Expands DHS Ombudsman to provide assistance to those who have been victims of crimes committed by aliens or border violence	
<b>Flake 1</b>	Includes private land representatives on the Department of Homeland Security Border Oversight Task Force	
<b>Flake 2</b>	Requires the GAO to prepare an annual assessment of the status and progress of the Southern Border Security Strategy	
<b>Feinstein 6</b>	Requires DHS to establish standards to ensure humane conditions for children in the CBP custody	
<b>Feinstein 7</b>	Requires allocations to law enforcement agencies for Operation Stonegarden be allocated through a competitive grant process.	
<b>Feinstein 8</b>	Requires CBP "to acquire and deploy watercraft to provide support for border-related maritime anti-crime activities"	
<b>Hirono 24</b>	Creates a new Ombudsman office in DHS	
<b>Grassley 4</b>	Modifies border triggers to legalization	
<b>Schumer 2</b>	Modifies the allocation of the CIR Trust Fund, to allow more funding for startup costs	<b>Passed</b> by a vote of 14-4
<b>Lee 4</b>	Adds congressional approval and President's signature to the border trigger	<b>Failed</b> by a vote of 6-12
<b>Grassley 1</b>	Expands border security strategies to all border sectors in the Southern border	<b>Passed</b> by a voice vote
<b>Grassley 24</b>	Establishes audit requirements for DHS, NSF, FEMA grant recipients	<b>Passed</b> by a voice vote
<b>Feinstein 9</b>	Establishes audit requirements for DHS, NSF, FEMA grant recipients	<b>Passed</b> by a voice vote
<b>Sessions 37</b>	strikes provision requiring DHS to issue use of force policies	<b>Failed</b> by a vote of 7-11
<b>Coons 2</b>	Require DHS to certify against dangerous deportation policies	<b>Withdrawn</b>
<b>Blumenthal 10</b>	allow DOJ to deny reimbursements for state and local prosecution costs if from unlawful conduct by a law enforcement officer	<b>Passed</b> by a voice vote
<b>Cruz 1</b>	Tripled border patrol agents, quadruples technology and infrastructure, and establishes tougher border triggers	<b>Failed</b> by a vote of 5-13
<b>Hirono 23</b>	Requires DHS to take into consideration humanitarian needs of those being repatriated/referred to prosecution at the border	<b>Passed</b> by a vote of 10-8
<b>Sessions 38</b>	Strikes provision requiring immigration law, civil rights training for DHS personnel.	<b>Withdrawn</b>
<b>Feinstein 11</b>	Redefining the border	<b>Withdrawn</b>
<b>Feinstein 1</b>	Extend SCAAP funding	<b>Passed</b> by a vote of 10-8
<b>Feinstein 10</b>	establishes a grant to improve transportation infrastructure at border crossings	<b>Passed</b> by a voice vote
<b>Leahy 4</b>	Gives DHS flexibility in how to spend funding to implement border security strategies	<b>Passed</b> by a voice vote
<b>Sessions 9</b>	establishes the completion of 700 miles of double-layer fencing as a trigger	<b>Failed</b> by a vote of 6-12
<b>Cornyn 1</b>	Modifying border security provisions, including tougher triggers	<b>Failed</b> by a vote of 6-12
<b>Feinstein 2</b>	provides additional permanent district court judgeships in the southwest border states	<b>Passed</b> by a voice vote
<b>Sessions 11</b>	Modifies border security strategy and border triggers, changes goal to 100% operational control	<b>Failed</b> by a vote of 6-12
<b>Cornyn 2</b>	Authorizes DHS to hire 5,000 new CBP officers to staff ports of entry	<b>Withdrawn</b>
