<b>Leahy 3</b>	To provide work authorization for aliens who are eligible for status as VAWA self-petitioners or for T or U visas while applications for such status or visas are pending.	<b>Passed</b> by voice vote
<b>Grassley 27</b>	Strikes the portion of the bill that removes the 1 year asylum filing deadline	Withdrawn
<b>Hatch 7</b>	To terminate certain preferential treatment in immigration of Amerasians.	<b>Passed</b> by voice vote
<b>Feinstein 3</b>	To provide for the admission to the United States of certain Tibetans.	<b>Passed</b> by voice vote
<b>Graham 2</b> (2nd Degree)	To provide for information sharing for visa – create an integrated database to track visa overstays	<b>Passed</b> by voice vote
<b>Klobuchar 2</b>	Adds elder abuse to list of crimes covered by the U visa	<b>Passed</b> by voice vote
<b>Sessions 31</b>	Limits EITC to USCs and LPRs	<b>Failed</b> by a vote of 8-10
<b>Franken 8</b> (2nd Degree)	Moves responsibility for counsel and child advocates for UACs from HHS to DOJ	<b>Passed</b> by voice vote
<b>Graham 1</b> (2nd Degree)	To provide for termination of asylum or refugee status in cases of country return.	<b>Passed</b> by voice vote
<b>Coons 5</b>	To provide aliens in removal proceedings the right to receive a complete copy of certain immigration documents.	<b>Passed</b> by voice vote
<b>Hatch 6</b>	To require the Secretary of Transportation to establish a mandatory biometric exit data system at airports in the United States with the highest volume of international air travel.	<b>Passed</b> by a vote of 13-5
<b>Feinstein 4</b>	To require background checks to be conducted on all refugees and asylees before they are granted such status.	<b>Passed</b> by voice vote
<b>Coons 8</b>	To ensure asylum applicants receive work authorization within 180 days of filing applications for asylum	<b>Passed</b> by voice vote
<b>Grassley 52</b>	To delay implementation of portions of the bill relating to asylum/refugees and student visas until 1 year after the Director of National Intelligence submits to Congress a review related of the Boston Marathon bombings.	<b>Failed</b> by voice vote
<b>Grassley 49</b>	To permit Federal law enforcement officers to take into account an individual's country of origin to the extent permitted by the United States Constitution and the laws of the United States.	<b>Failed</b> by voice vote
<b>Feinstein 5</b> (2nd Degree)	To establish a pilot program to deter, detect, and prevent child trafficking.	<b>Passed</b> by voice vote
<b>Grassley 43</b>	Broadens gang inadmissibility/deportability/	<b>Failed</b> by a vote of 8-10
<b>Sessions 7</b>	To provide sanctions for countries that delay or prevent repatriation of their citizens and nationals.	Withdrawn

<b>Franken 7</b>	To protect children affected by immigration enforcement actions.	<b>Passed</b> by a vote of 18-0
<b>Lee 16</b> (2nd Degree)	Strikes language in the bill that focuses penalties for immigration and visa fraud on criminal schemes instead of individuals	<b>Passed</b> by voice vote.
<b>Coons 6</b> (2nd Degree)	Eliminates current requirement that employment authorization be given to an asylum-seeker only after 180 days	<b>Passed</b> voice vote.
<b>Grassley 45</b>	Expands the criminal penalties for illegal entry and reentry as well as immigration document fraud	<b>Failed</b> by a vote of 8-10
<b>Blumenthal 2</b>	Limits solitary confinement	<b>Passed</b> by voice vote.
<b>Sessions 10</b> (2nd Degree)	Amends public charge ground of inadmissibility to include receipt of Medicaid and SNPA, which is counter to current policy.	<b>Failed</b> by voice vote
<b>Coons 12</b>	Denies safe haven to human rights violators (genocide, crimes against humanity, and war crimes)	<b>Passed</b> by voice vote
<b>Lee 17</b>	Amends the bill to prohibit attempted misuse of a passport (in addition to actual misuse)	<b>Passed</b> by voice vote
<b>Blumenthal 3</b> (2nd Degree)	To ensure effective enforcement of protections against trafficking and abuse involving workers recruited abroad	<b>Passed</b> by voice vote
<b>Grassley 47</b>	Would strike the bond provisions in the bill.	<b>Failed</b> by voice vote
<b>Blumenthal 4</b>	Requires DHS to consult with DOL in promulgating foreign labor recruiter regulations	<b>Passed</b> by voice vote
<b>Sessions 12</b>	Imposes bonds of not less than \$5,000 before immigrants from noncontiguous countries are released from detention	<b>Failed</b> by a vote of 9-9
<b>Blumenthal 5</b> (2nd Degree)	Requires employers to disclose the employees the terms and conditions of their visa, visa renewal terms and responsibility for expenses and disallows changes in an employee's contract without 24 hours' notice and voluntary consent of the employee.	<b>Passed</b> by voice vote.
<b>Hatch 2</b>	Would impose enhanced penalties for cultivating marijuana on federal lands.	<b>Passed</b> by voice vote.
<b>Sessions 32</b> (2nd Degree)	Affirms inherent authority under 287(g) and denies federal funds to states/localities that don't cooperate with law enforcement	<b>Failed</b> by voice vote
<b>Hirono 22</b> (2nd Degree)	Child Trafficking Victims Protection Act	<b>Passed</b> by voice vote
<b>Grassley 44</b> (2nd Degree - Schumer)	Makes a 3rd drunk driving incident an aggravated felony if there is a term of imprisonment of 1 year	<b>Passed</b> by 17 -1
<b>Blumenthal 8</b> (2nd Degree)	Codifies existing policy prohibiting enforcement at sensitive locations	<b>Passed</b> by voice vote
<b>Grassley 27 (Part 1)</b>	Would eliminate the portion of the bill that eliminates the 1 year asylum filing deadline (strikes 3401/3404)	<b>Failed</b> by a vote of 6 - 12

<b>Grassley 27 (Part 2)</b>	Would deny RPI eligibility to anyone who filed a frivolous asylum application	<b>Failed</b> by a vote of 9- 9
<b>Coons 10 (2nd Degree)</b>	To provide that individuals authorized to be employed in the U.S. may not be denied professional, commercial, or business licenses on the basis of immigration status	<b>Passed</b> by voice vote
<b>Grassley 11</b>	Removes protections for RPI eligible/RPIs individuals apprehended by ICE; Eliminates the waiver that would allow deported individuals or reentered after 12/31/11 to apply for RPI status; Allows removal of RPIs if removal ground arose after application for RPI status	<b>Failed</b> by a vote of 6- 12
<b>Blumenthal 12</b>	Allows naturalization from RPI status for DREAMers serving in the military	<b>Passed</b> by voice vote.
<b>Graham 3 (2nd Degree)</b>	Requires additional security screening for certain aliens who live in regions/countries where there are terrorists/groups who may pose a threat to the U.S.	<b>Passed</b> by voice vote.
<b>Hirono 21</b>	Makes DREAMers eligible for federal financial aid	<b>Passed</b> by voice vote.
<b>Sessions 16</b>	Require RPI applications to be filed electronically; clarify the national security and law enforcement clearances required for an alien to be granted registered provisional immigrant status, to require interviews of certain applicants for adjustment of status, to require a fraud detection and deterrence plan to be submitted to Congress, and to impose penalties for knowingly committing or aiding fraud.	<b>Failed</b> by a vote of 6-12
<b>Cornyn 3</b>	The amendment denies RPI status for misdemeanors including domestic violence, child abuse, assault.	<b>Failed</b> by a vote of 8-12
<b>Hirono 12</b>	Would allow applicants for RPI status to pay the fine in installments	<b>Passed</b> by voice vote.
<b>Hirono 16</b>	To remove barriers to health care and nutrition assistance for children, pregnant women, and lawfully present individuals.	Withdrawn
<b>Hirono 17</b>	Would add provisions relating to health care.	Withdrawn
<b>Grassley 18</b>	To require applicants for RPI status to disclose all SSNs used to obtain employment in the U.S.	<b>Failed</b> by a vote of 8-10
<b>Whitehouse 5</b>	To increase public safety by permitting the Attorney General to deny the transfer of firearms or the issuance of firearms and explosives licenses to known or suspected dangerous terrorists	Withdrawn
<b>Blumenthal 6</b>	To amend the law relating to the prohibition of the sale of firearms to, or the possession of firearms by, aliens not lawfully admitted for permanent residence.	Withdrawn
<b>Blumenthal 9</b>	To require the Attorney General to notify the Secretary of Homeland Security of any failure to pass a background check due to status as a prohibited alien and for other purposes.	Withdrawn
