| <p>P.1, at the very top right column “who may file this form?” I. Reentry Permit insert new language to read as follows:</p> | <p><b>A. If you are in the United States</b> as a permanent resident or conditional permanent resident, you may apply for a reentry permit.</p> <p>Departure from the United States before a decision is made on the application for a reentry permit does not affect the application.</p> <p>You must be physically present in the United States when you file the application. However, a reentry permit may be sent to a U.S. embassy or consulate or Department of Homeland Security (DHS) office abroad for you to pick up, if you request it when you file your application.</p> | <p><b>A.If you are in the United States</b> as a permanent resident or conditional permanent resident, you may apply for a reentry permit. <b>After filing your application for Reentry Permit, USCIS will inform you in writing when to go to your local Application Support Center (ASC) for your biometrics appointment. There is an additional \$80.00 fee for taking your fingerprints.</b></p> <p><b>You must be physically present in the United States when you file the application. However, a reentry permit may be sent to a U.S. Embassy or Consulate or Department of Homeland Security (DHS) office abroad for you to pick up, if you request it when you file your application.</b></p> <p>Departure from the United States before a decision is made on the application for a reentry permit does not affect the application. <b>However, departure from the United States should not occur before your biometrics (fingerprints) have been taken.</b></p> <p>With the exception of having to obtain a returning resident visa abroad, a reentry permit does not relieve you of any of the requirements of the United States immigration laws.</p> <p>If you stay outside the United States for less than one year, you are not required to apply for a reentry permit. You may reenter the United States on your Permanent Resident card (Form I-551).</p> <p>If you intend to apply in the future for naturalization, absences from the United States for one year or more will generally break the continuity of your required continuous residence in the United States. If you intend to remain outside the United States for one year or more, you should file a Form N-470, Application to Preserve Residence for Naturalization Purposes. For further information,</p> |

If you are not eligible for both items 1 and 2 above, you may apply for advance parole without additional fee, provided you have evidence of filing Form I-485. If you are not filing for advance parole concurrently, Form I-797 may be used as proof of I-485 filing.</p> |
