H-1B Specialty Occupations Premium Processing There is a statutory numerical limit, or "cap," on the total number aliens who may be issued a visa or otherwise provided H-2B status (including through a change of status) during a fiscal year. Other USCIS Links Currently, the H-2B cap set by Congress is 66,000 per fiscal year, with 33,000 to be allocated for employment beginning in the 1st half of the fiscal year (October 1 - March 31) and 33,000 to be VIBE Program TITLE 8 CODE OF FEDERAL allocated for employment beginning in the 2nd half of the fiscal year (April 1 - September 30). Any **REGULATIONS (8 CFR)** unused numbers from the first half of the fiscal year will be made available for use by employers Public Releases: Visas: H-2A seeking to hire H-2B workers during the second half of the fiscal year. Numerical Limitation Exemption I Representatives of Foreign for H Nonimmigrants Employed Persons who are exempt from the H-2B cap in the CNMI and Guam (PDF) L-1A Intracompany Transferee Non-USCIS Links Generally, an H-2B worker who extends his/her stay in H-2B status will not be counted again U.S. Department of Labor: L-1B Intracompany Transferee against the H-2B cap. Similarly, the spouse and children of H-2B workers classified as H-4 Foreign Labor Certification nonimmigrants are not counted against this cap. Additionally petitions for the following types of Department of State: Visa workers are exempt the H-2B cap Bulletin Identification of Foreign Fish roe processors, fish roe technicians and/or supervisors of fish roe processing Countries Whose Nationals Are From November 28, 2009 until December 31, 2014, workers performing labor or services in the Commonwealth of Northern Mariana Islands (CNMI) and/or Guam. This number will always be higher than the actual cap. <sup>2</sup> As noted, if the cap is not reached for the 1st half of the fiscal year, those numbers will be made Entrepreneurs in Residence available for use during the 2nd half of the fiscal year. In some fiscal years, therefore, depending on demand for H-2B workers, more than 33,000 cap-subject persons may be granted H-2B status during the 2nd half of the fiscal year.
