If you are still financially dependent on your parents, you may apply for naturalization either where you go to school or where your family lives.

Spouses of a U.S. citizen employed abroad:

If you are residing outside of the United States, are filing under INA section 319(b), and want USCIS to collect your biometrics in the United States, then you must provide an address in the United States. USCIS will send a letter to that mailing address notifying you when and where to go for biometrics services.

Applicants receiving benefits under the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA):

If you received benefits under VAWA, you are not required to disclose the confidential address of a shelter. If you are residing at a shelter at the time of filing this application, you may provide a "safe address" where you are able to receive mail. If you are not currently residing in a shelter, but have resided

in a shelter for part of the reporting period, you may provide the city and state of residence alone.
