Members of the Military and their Families

Citizenship for Military Members & Dependents

Members and veterans of the U.S. armed forces, and their dependents may be eligible for citizenship under special provisions of law. For more information, see the <u>Citizenship for Military Personnel & Family Members</u> page.

Family Based Survivor Benefits (for Relatives)

Immediate relatives of U.S. armed forces members who die as a result of combat while in an active duty status may be eligible for certain "survivor" immigration benefits, including citizenship. For more information, see the <u>Family Based Survivor Benefits</u> page.

Military Parole in Place

If you are in the U.S. without admission or parole, you may request parole in place if you are a spouse, child (unmarried and under 21), or parent of a current or former active duty or Selected Reserve of the Ready Reserve service member.

To request parole, you must submit the following to the director of the <u>USCIS office with jurisdiction over</u> <u>your place of residence</u>:

- Completed <u>Form I-131</u>, <u>Application for Travel Document</u> (without fee) with "**Military PIP**" written in Part 2;
- Evidence of the family relationship;
- Evidence that your family member is a current or former member of the U.S. armed forces, such as a photocopy of the front and back of the service member's military identification card or DD Form 214;
- Two identical, color passport style photographs; and
- Evidence of any additional favorable discretionary factors that you would like us to consider.
