Dear Member of Congress:

As a diverse coalition of immigrant and civil rights, faith, labor, human rights and community organizations serving and advocating on behalf of immigrant victims of domestic violence, human trafficking, sexual assault, dating violence, and stalking we write to express our grave concerns with and our opposition to the amendment introduced by Senator Grassley to the Violence Against Women Reauthorization Act in 2012 (S. 1925) and which may be introduced again in the VAWA Reauthorization Act of 2013 (S. 47). The amendment attempts to use VAWA as a back door to address other immigration matters that are irrelevant to the focus of VAWA, thus threatening to undermine the integrity and purpose of VAWA. This non-germane amendment, which was included in the Judiciary committee markups of VAWA without advance warning, was subsequently opposed by many national immigration advocacy and civil rights organizations. While we applaud the sponsors and cosponsors of S.47 for not including this provision in the reintroduction of VAWA, we urge all Senators to oppose any attempts to reattach this non-germane and harmful amendment to the VAWA bill on the Senate floor.

Since the enactment of the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) in 1994, Congress has recognized that immigrant victims of domestic violence and sexual assault face significant and particular barriers to seeking safety and justice, finding that control over a victim's immigration status, or a lack of status, is often used as a tool of abuse. As a result, Congress has enacted important immigration remedies, such as the VAWA self-petition, U-visa and T-visa, to encourage victims of domestic violence, sexual assault, and human trafficking to seek help and safety for themselves and their children and to hold perpetrators accountable.

Any proposals to change the Immigration and Nationality Act (INA) that are irrelevant to VAWA's focus on domestic violence, sexual assault, dating violence, stalking and human trafficking should be kept out of VAWA.

Senator Grassley's amendment, elevating a third drunk driving conviction to the status of an aggravated felony for the purposes of immigration removal, does not belong in VAWA. Should Senator Grassley or another senator attempt once more to amend S. 47to expand aggravated felonies unrelated to VAWA, it will undermine VAWA's purpose and potentially open up VAWA in the future to many other non-germane and harmful provisions that can act as "poison pills." When this amendment was attached to the VAWA bill in 2012, it was the first time since VAWA was first enacted in 1994 and subsequently reauthorized on two occasions, that VAWA was hijacked as a vehicle to make changes to the Immigration and

Nationality Act that are not germane and undermine its focus on addressing domestic violence, sexual assault, dating violence, stalking and human trafficking.

VAWA is not the place to include such a provision, let alone debate its merits. However, a debate on the merits surely would be necessary in another venue since such an amendment raises due process concerns and reverses established Supreme Court precedence on such matters.

VAWA has a long history of uniting lawmakers who may not agree on other policy issues but who have the common purpose of protecting survivors. Each year the lives of thousands of women, children, and others who fall victim to domestic violence, human trafficking, sexual assault, dating violence and stalking are made safer by important programs and protections that VAWA created. On their behalf and on behalf of all others who will depend upon VAWA in years to come, we ask for your vigilance in preserving VAWA's central purpose.
